A Word About Grace Station. The Grace Station is an extension of the church office, set up in the Narthex on Sunday mornings for your convenience. Our Office Administrator, Don Boelter, can answer your questions, offer help, accept messages, and provide information on upcoming events. You'll also find schedules, recent issues of our newsletter *Tower Echoes*, and more.

Welcome Val Rogers! Yesterday, Val Rogers led the Gospel Choir and 20 members of the community in a South African Gospel Workshop. She will be leading the Gospel Choir at the 8:30 worship this morning.

Val is a teacher and passionate organizer working to expand and enrich the community singing experience. After 15 years leading community choirs, Val recently began teaching at world music camps, festivals, and workshops on the west coast and in Europe. In 2007, Val toured professionally with the vocal ensemble Northern Harmony, performing and teaching South African and other world vocal music in France, Italy, England, Germany, and the Netherlands.

Intensely drawn to southern African choral singing since first encountering it over a decade ago, Val's devotion to learning and sharing this music is driven by the powerful sense of joy and bonding participants inevitably experience. Her knowledge and love of this song/dance tradition has been nurtured by Zimbabwean, South African, and North American teachers, especially Sheasby Matiure, Matlakala Bopape, and Patty Cuyler. In addition to teaching, Val regularly organizes and presents world music camps, concerts, and workshops near her hometown of Eugene, Oregon.

Rocky Piro will leave Seattle tomorrow to join 15 other members of a delegation from the ELCA on an official visit to the world leaders of other church bodies. Bishop Mark Hanson leads this visit every three years which includes official meetings with the Archbishop of Canterbury, Rowan Williams in London, Pope Benedict XVI in Rome and other Vatican dignitaries, the Patriarch of the Orthodox Church in Istanbul, and a visit to the Lutheran World Federation and the World Council of Churches in Geneva. Rocky serves as President of the ELCA's Lutheran Ecumenical Representatives Network (LERN) and works closely with the ELCA's Office of Ecumenical and Inter-religious Affairs in Chicago. He will share the highlights of this trip in Sunday Adult Education sessions after his return.

TAX REFORM: The Conversation Continues. Adult Forum Sunday, 7 February at 10 in the Tree of Life Room. We've heard from the Lutheran Public Policy Office (Sunday, 24 Jan). 40 Days in the Wilderness: A Women's Lenten Retreat. Women of the congregation and friends are invited to a mini-retreat in preparation for their 2010 Lenten journey. On Ash Wednesday, February 17, the retreat will precede the Ash Wednesday service from 9 to 11 a.m. The retreat will be repeated on Saturday, February 20 from 9 to 11:30 (including worship) for those who are unable to attend on Wednesday morning. Evening Prayer. Each Sunday at 7 p.m. the congregation gathers for a service of Evening Prayer, most typically held in the chapel. The evening prayer services are in various styles – from simple spoken rites to formal sung liturgies. Each Sunday evening prayer ends by offering a brief service of Holy Communion. Pastors then remain available at prayers stations to offer healing prayers and anointing for individuals who desire these prayers.

Another way to help Haiti. The IRS has announced that deductible cash contributions to made to charities after January 11, 2010 and before March 1, 2010 to aid relief efforts in Haiti may be deducted as charitable contributions either from 2010 income, which would be the usual case, or from 2009 income. Although this special tax relief provision is available only to taxpayers who itemize deductions, for some taxpayers it will greatly accelerate the benefit of the charitable deduction for their cash contributions by allowing them to claim the deduction a year earlier.
